FATHER'S DAY BRUNCH



In June Reception visited Bowes Museum in Barnard Castle. We were going there as part of an Art Project for all the Reception classes in County Durham.

First we looked at very big paintings by an Italian painter called Canaletto. We lo

paintings in particular the buildings and the boats. We learnt about the origins of one of the paintings, that it depicts an annual event where by the Mayor through a gold ring into the water and said 'sea be calm' in order to ask the sea to look after the boats as they travelled to all parts of the world.

Our Celebration Assembly

Reception children celebrated the end of their time in Early Years with a Graduation Ceremony. They all looked splendid in their uniform and mortarboards. Children had chosen a selection of songs from their time in Reception with some new ones. They sang together and joined in with actions and movement enthusiastically. Between each song groups of children came out to receive certificates from our Head Teacher, Mrs. Boulton, celebrating their achievements in Reception. Some children had excelled in Reading, Writing, Maths, Computing or Sports, while other awards included Building and Construction, Creative and Design, Science and Investigation and Imaginative Role Play.

The children were also given a set of cards on their way to the area for the mini-beast activities for some objects to spot on their way.





The RE part of the trip involved a tour of the Cathedral alongside a re-telling of the story of Saint Cuthbert.

The children were able to dress up as various characters from the play as they went around the cathedral.

In the end we had children dressed as a sheep, a cow, a bishop, a king, a monk and a Viking! The tour took us all around the cathedral eventually ending up at Saint Cuthbert's burial site in the back of the Cathedral.

Children observed the piglets that had just been born and listened to talks that the keepers gave about how they are looked after and how old some of the pigs are.



Each class had the chance to hold some chickens and collect eggs inside the hen house.





They all went then to examine grass. The farm has about 27 varieties of grass which grow in their fields to feed animals. We all laid down to listen to the noises around the farm and discussed what other creatures live in and around the fields.



The farm has hundreds of sheep and we were lucky enough to watch the sheep being sheared. The shearers explained how and why they shear the sheep and allowed children to feel the wool.



Finally we were allowed to work in groups to solve the orienteering trail through the woods and play on the climbing equipment.



The children had a fabulous day and learned lots about how farms care for animals and make food.

They did different challenges to do with maths and at the end our school won some prizes like pens, pencil cases and notebooks. Everybody who took part got a puzzle rubber and a certificate.

The first challenge was to make polyhedrons by connecting 'limping seagulls' together. The next challenge was to play Pentominoes. Pentominoes is a game where you have two players that try to stop each other from fitting an irregular shape onto the board. The third challenge was Crystal Maze. In this teams had to work together to solve problems. The final challenge was a maths relay. Each time a question was finished correctly, another one was given.

Y6 visit to Darlington College.

On the date of 12/07/17, Y6 visited Darlington College to find out facts and information about the facilities and courses they had, to see if they would like to go there after secondary school. Y6 had a small yet quick tour of just some of the rooms they had to offer from the downstairs point of view. Y6 were separated into 2 groups of 5, and 1 group of 6; all groups were led to a different room which held different activities inside of them. The activities included: catering, child care, motor vehicles and engineering. Catering was enjoyed thoroughly as Y6 got to make chocolate lollies and personalise them with decorations of their choice. Childcare got as messy as can be, because the group got to fidget with: gloop (a substance that is created with cornflour and water), paint on trays (that was when they got to draw/create patterns with their fingers/hands) and play-dough (that was when they got to experiment with plastic knives and cookie cutters). The motor vehicle and the engineering activity really got the boys buzzing, as Y6 got to: look under cars, stare at new and old engines and they even got to look at some really interesting car body paint designs. Once all of Y6 got back together, they were given their lollies, and then it was time to wave goodbye and leave. Y6 thoroughly enjoyed this trip to Darlington College and the teachers enjoyed it as well.

After winning the heats at Ferryhill College, four mathematicians (named Ben Moore, Jake Sharp, William Foster and Eve Finch), went to the County Maths Challenge Final, at Bishop Barrington, on the 7.7.17. At the event, there were lots of activities that included: a poster round, a logic round, a games round, a relay round and rounds where they had to answer word problems. In the poster round, the children had to make a poster, which they had prepared before the event. The logic round was made up of clues and a grid, which needed to be filled with answers. You had to read the clues extremely carefully and make sure that the answers were in the correct boxes otherwise you wouldn't get the marks. The games round consisted of two games called Pentominoes and Sim. To play Pentominoes you need an evenly squared 8 by 8 grid and 12 different shapes that are made up of 5 squares. The aim of the game was to place as many pieces on the grid and make it so your opponent can't place any more pieces on the grid. Sim is all about triangles. You are not allowed to make a triangle using 3 of the 6 points on the board. In the relay round, your team was split into 2 pairs, you had to run to your member of staff that went with you, collect a maths question and give it to the other pair – on the opposite side of the room to where you were sitting. This was repeated until the round ended. Timothy Hackworth came 1" in the relay round and 2nd overall.

We have recently made a significant investment in the Lexia Reading **Program** for use in the current **Years 4 – 6.** The program enables children to access materials that are specifically tailored to their reading needs. Most importantly, the content available changes in response to their changing needs. For example, if a reader is identified as needing to practise reading idioms they will automatically be given appropriate activities.

It has been a big hit with the children and 73 certificates have been issued since we began using it just a short time ago!

The program will continue to be used in Years 5 and 6, in September.


Opportunities at Home

Sun Safety

We all need some sun exposure – it's a source of vitamin D which helps our bodies absorb calcium for stronger healthier bones but too much sun can cause skin damage, eye damage, immune system suppression and skin cancer.

Children's skin needs protection from the sun's harmful ultraviolet (UV) rays whenever they're outdoors – not just on holiday!



<u>Shade</u>

UV rays are strongest and most harmful during midday so try to avoid outdoor activities or seek shade under a tree, umbrella or pop up tent

<u>Wear a hat</u>

Hats that shade the face, scalp, ears and neck are easy to use and offer great protection. Baseball caps don't protect the ears so use a sunscreen.



Wear sunglasses

Sunglasses protect eyes from UV rays which can lead to cataracts later in life. Wraparound sunglasses are best.



Apply Sunscreen

Use sunscreen with at least SPF 15 and UVA and UVB protection every time your child goes outside. Apply generously 30 minutes before going outside. Don't forget ears, nose, lips and the top of feet. Reapply regularly during the day.

Unprotected skin can be damaged by UV rays in as little as 15 minutes.

UV rays are still present on cloudy days so still take precautions.

Warm weather can cause dehydration so make sure your child drinks plenty of water especially during the summer months.

Plan ahead - keep sun cream handy and put a hat and sun cream in your child's bag for use at school.
