Ofsted Update - Progress so Far: Article 28 - All children have the right to a good education

Following our Ofsted inspection in November 2015, I explained that there would be an 'Ofsted Update' in each Newsletter to inform you of our progress. To date, we have focused on the following:

The Post-Ofsted Action Plan is currently being implemented, monitored and reviewed on a regular basis; Although overall attendance levels are improving, there continues to be a large number of children whose attendance and punctuality is a cause for concern. We need your help with this. Legal action will be taken where necessary in order to address the issue of persistent absenteeism in school. Please help your children and us by sending your child into school each day;

The children are currently completing end of Spring half term assessments. Data from these assessments will be analysed and actions identified;

Improvements continue to be seen in the children's 'Behaviour for Learning' across the school. This means that children are focusing and concentrating on their learning rather than becoming distracted;

Planned monitoring of teaching and learning throughout the school continues to take place;

Training days and staff meetings are focused on key actions from the Ofsted inspection report;

There continues to be a significant focus on the teaching and learning of Reading (including Phonics), Writing and Mathematics across the school.

We continue to receive many positive comments from parents, carers, other local schools and members of the local community who praise the work of children and staff.

Parking and Traffic around School

Article 19- All children have the right to be safe.

Parking continues to be a serious concern around our school. Recently, a child was almost knocked over by a speeding car. Thankfully, due to the very quick reactions of the child's mum, she managed to prevent her child, and his siblings, from being hurt by the car. This could have had very serious consequences. Mrs. Simpson, our School Crossing Patrol lady, continues to do a sterling job in working with us and the local police to ensure that your children have the right to be safe when crossing the road.

It is important that the crossing patrol area, marked with a single yellow line, is left clear at all times. If this area is not left clear, Mrs. Simpson is not able to have a clear view of the traffic, as cars that park on this yellow line are an obstruction.

Thank you to all parents who use the recommended one-way system when dropping off and collecting children in cars. Although this oneway system is voluntary, we highly recommend this in order to keep your children safe from potential traffic hazards. Please also take care not to park in front of driveways. We are very keen for your children to be safe outside our school as well as within it. Thank you for your continued support.

Article 28 – All children have the right to learn

Thank you for your support for sending your child/ren to school on time

every day. It is crucial that children are in school so they can move forward with their learning and make progress.

Please continue to provide medical evidence if your child is absent from school through illness. G.P. surgeries and pharmacists do provide medical evidence cards; please ask for this evidence and bring to school.

Although overall attendance levels are improving, there continues to be a large number of children whose attendance is a cause for concern. We need your help with this. Legal action will be taken where necessary in order to address the issue of unauthorised absences linked to persistent absenteeism in school.

Medicines and Care at the Chemist

Article 24 - All children have the right to be healthy

School is now able to administer medication if medicine is prescribed by a pharmacist or G.P. 3 times a day. School will continue to administer prescribed medication for 4 times a day. We know that this is helpful to parents and carers as it ensures that children are able to maintain their attendance record at school. Please see Mrs. Smith in the School Office should you require any further information.

If your child needs to see a Pharmacist for medical treatment, please ask the Pharmacist for a 'Care at the Chemist' card which can then be brought into school so that your child's absence due to medical attention can be authorised.

Important Notice—Online Safety

Online Safety and the Use of Social Media

Article 19 - All children have the right to be safe

At Timothy Hackworth Primary School we are committed to promoting the safe and responsible use of the internet. We feel that the use of social media by children, is becoming an increasing concern outside of school due to the increase in inappropriate use of Facebook, Online Gaming and other Apps.

Many of the issues, outside of school, that have been brought to our attention by your children, parents and carers and local police have involved the use of:

- Facebook Users are required to be at least 13 years old before an account can be created.
- Instagram Users are required to be at least 13 years old before an account can be created.
- Skype Users are required to be at least 13 years old before an account can be created.
- WhatsApp Users are required to be at least 16 years old before an account can be created.

Other Apps ,for example, Oovoo and WhatsApp are also being used inappropriately by children outside of school.

Children, out of school, often create 'groups' to which others are joining. This means that all information is shared with groups so privacy is lost, and in some cases, strangers are then added to the group.

We understand that it is increasingly difficult to keep up with the ways that our children are using new and ever-changing technologies. Our children are immersed in a society that is increasingly dependent on powerful computers, including smartphones, ipads, interactive online games and virtual communities. Websites such as Facebook and Instagram do offer wonderful opportunities for communication and social interactions, however, they are created for a specific audience which are for people for those 13 years old or over. When monitoring your child/ren on the internet, please consider the following concerns around the use of social media:

Many sites use 'targeted' advertising and therefore your child could be exposed to adverts of an inappropriate nature.

Young people may accept 'friend' requests from people they don't know in real life which could increase the risk of inappropriate contact or behaviour. The general rule is, if they aren't friends in real life, they shouldn't be 'friends' online.

Language, games, groups and content posted or shared on social media is NOT moderated, and therefore can be offensive, illegal or unsuitable for young people.

Photographs shared by users are NOT moderated and therefore young people could be exposed to inappropriate images or even post their own.

Under-age users might be less likely to keep their identities private and lying about their age can expose them to further risks regarding privacy settings and options.

Social media sites can be exploited by bullies and for inappropriate contact.

Social media sites cannot and do not verify its members, therefore, it is important to remember that if your child can make up who they are online, so can anyone else.

Should you decide to allow your child to have an online profile we strongly advise that you:

Check their profile is set to private and that only their friends can see information they post.

Monitor your child's use and talk to them about safe and appropriate online behaviour such as not sharing personal information and not posting or messaging offensive/inappropriate behaviour messages or photos.

Monitor your child's use of language and how they communicate to others.

Have a look at advice to parents on the social media sites.

Set up your own profiles so you understand how the site works and ask them to have you as their friend online so you know what they are posting online.

Make sure your child understands the following:

Always keep your profile private.

Never accept a friend that you do not know in real life.

Never post anything which could reveal your identity including photographs.

Never post anything that you wouldn't want your parents or teachers to see.

Never agree to meet somebody you only know online without telling a trusted adult.

Always tell someone if you feel threatened or if someone upsets you.

In school, we do our best to ensure that children are aware of how to stay safe online.

We hope you will find Discovery Education Espresso useful as a resource to extend your child's learning. If you have any further questions about how to use the service, please speak to your child's teacher.


