Parent Governor Vacancy

CRC Article 28 - All children have the right to a good quality education.

We currently have a vacancy for a Parent Governor on our Governing Body.

Our Governing Body has a membership of 9 Governors, with representatives from the staff, local community and parents.

The Governing Body does not get involved in the day to day running of the school; they have a strategic role with responsibility for overseeing leadership and

management. It has 3 core functions:

- · setting strategic direction;
- · creating robust accountability;
- · ensuring best use of financial resources.

The full Governing Body must meet at least three times per academic year, and also have frequent Committee Meetings each term. There is an expectation that Governors will also undertake monitoring visits into school to find out more about the school throughout the year. Individual governors do not have any powers, instead, the Governing Body works closely with the Head Teacher and makes decisions collectively as a team.

Any parent, or carer, of a registered pupil at the school at the time of election is eligible to stand for election as a Parent Governor (subject to certain exceptions). Parent Governors are elected by other parents at the school - if there are more applications than spaces available, an election will be arranged, so please be aware that you may have to produce a personal statement for ballot papers.

Appointment is also subject to eligibility criteria and completion of a Disclosure and Barring Service check.

All Governors must abide by our agreed Code of Conduct, including issues such as confidentiality, conflicts of interest and training requirements.

Prospective candidates are invited to speak with the Head Teacher and Chair of Governors, prior to submitting an application, so that they are fully aware of the roles and responsibilities involved.

In the Autumn Term, each of the KS2 classes held fantastic Tables Challenge Competitions. Each class selected eight Tables Champions, who competed against each other, in a variety of Maths challenges, both on paper and online. They had to compete in front of an audience of their classmates, who cheered and encouraged them all. The audience also had to take part in a range of activities, designed to help them practise their tables too. The final round of each competition was a head-to-head challenge. All of the competitions were very close! All the competitors were brilliant, showing great resilience and resourcefulness. Well done to everyone who took part.

The Great Tables Challenge!

When it comes to times tables, speed AND accuracy are important – the more tables facts your child remembers, the easier it is for them to succeed in Maths. Being able to recall times tables quickly and accurately is an essential skill to have. It will help when doing harder calculations and will help develop mental methods of calculation but also being able to recall multiplication facts helps children with topics like fractions and measurement too. **The Government have also introduced a Multiplication Tables Test for all Y4s to take in June 2022.**

Times Table Rock Stars is a fun and challenging website designed to help children master the times tables! We feel that the earlier children start learning multiplication tables, the better, which is why we are using Times Tables Rockstars from Y2 to Y6!

World famous rock musicians are the best at what they do because they've spent hours practising guitar chords, writing music or playing on the drums. It's just the same with times tables – all Times Table Rock Stars need to practise and practise and practise. It's absolutely essential that your child does a little bit of times table practice at home. In my experience, short bursts of practice on a daily basis are more effective than spending hours once a week.

And this is where you come in. For your child to be fully motivated and for them to get the best out of the practice, they need your help. Without your praise and your reminders, without you sitting down next to them or checking their work,



practising times tables will not feel important to your child.

There are three types of bullying - verbal, physical and indirect. The training informed Year 4

that bullying is repeated negative behaviour that is intended to make others feel upset. Year 4 are committed to promoting an anti-bullying culture and communities of kindness across our

school.

Even though we were unable to celebrate World Book Day 2021 in the normal way and dressing up as our favourite book characters, it didn't stop the pupils at Timothy Hackworth Primary School enjoying lots of different stories and books. Both pupils in and out of school Primary School enjoying lots of different stories and books. Both pupils in and out of school took part in activities such as the Extreme Reading Challenge, listening to stories in French with Nathalie Paris, designing and making their own book front covers and listening to lots of stories over the day.

We believe that there is no greater joy than losing yourself in a great book! Reading allows people of all ages to be transported from our own world to another. Between the pages of a book, we can become engrossed in a fictional world or learn entirely new things from a non-fiction book.

Other benefits of reading include: learning new words and phrases; experiencing a range of emotions; learning new skills and acquiring new knowledge. At Timothy Hackworth Primary School, we believe that from our very youngest children in our Two Year Old Provision, all the way up to our Year 6 young people, the importance of reading should never be underestimated.

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Early Years Family Groups

During the Summer Term, the older Nursery children and both Reception classes have taken part in fortnightly Family Groups activities.



Through these activities, the children are developing an understanding of human rights as they build on their skills to: listen respectfully, communicate ideas and work collaboratively in small groups.

The first session involved the children using their pupil voice, making a choice when voting, to decide which set of animals to use for the Early Years Family Groups. After a fair vote the groups became, 'Animal Babies!'

Subsequent lessons have focussed on basic rights, as the children have talked together about what <u>all</u> children need to stay alive and grow up well. Using real objects and 'real life' photographs, the children have engaged in class discussions and played simple games, describing what they have observed.

The children now know that all children have a right to clean water, food, a home, and to be looked after by adults. They are also beginning to find about the experiences of children in other countries and cultures as they recognise similarities and differences between their own lives and the lives of others.

We wanted to personalise our blankets for Teddy so we thought it would be a wonderful idea to sew our initials onto the blanket.

Once we had our design idea in place, we practised our sewing skills.

We used a simple running stitch for this and practised both our initials onto fabric and we learned how to join two fabrics together. Can you work out who these initials belong to?





Our sewing skills improved and our confidence increased, so we began to make blankets.
We chose a soft felt material so that Teddy would be comfortable; it is very important that your product matches its purpose and use.

We evaluated that we had succeeded in our task to design and make a comfy picnic blanket for Teddy. Now all that he needs is a little bit of sunshine and some yummy picnic food!







Express yourself - North East Festival of Languages

During this week long festival, classes throughout the school participated in world culture sessions to increase their knowledge of languages and cultures. Children used their pupil voice to decide which session they would like to participate in. The choices were: Spanish; French; a puppet show; dance and drumming workshops. The children learned about the culture of Spain and France and then had fun by learning new words and actions alongside the words. The children had a brilliant time. Fantastique!

Since returning from Lockdown, our Two-Year-Olds have settled in well this new term. We have been focusing on topics such as 'Farm Animals' and 'New Life'. At the start of this term, we read the story, 'The Pig in the Pond', where the children were introduced to Farmer Neligan and his farm. This story allowed them to recognise different farm animals and the noises that they make.







The children have enjoyed various activities based on our topic of New Life, looking at the life cycle of a frog, a chick and a butterfly. We have read books such as, 'Dora's Eggs', 'Timothy Toad' and 'The Very Hungry Caterpillar'. These stories have helped the children to understand how these animals develop and change.

Nuffield Early Language Intervention





The Reception Classes have recently started the NELI programme with small groups of children. Each day, the children are introduced to new vocabulary as they play games and use picture cards. 'Ted' works alongside the children each session and awards a 'Best Listener' each day.

During each lesson, the children are encouraged to speak in sentences as they talk about the; who, what, why and when details that they can see in each picture. The children play games such as 'Simon Says' and take turns with throw and catch activities. All activities incorporate key vocabulary and simple instructions so that the children repeat what is being learnt.

The key vocabulary during this first topic, 'My Body' has been: wrist, ankle, fingers, thumbs, toe/toes, foot/feet, shake, throw, catch, fast and slow.

The first few sessions have been really enjoyable; the children have all been working hard, concentrating and making every effort to speak in full sentences rather than just isolated words.



Tree Planting

Year 5 have planted over 300 trees around the school field this year! The trees are a mixture of Oak, Hawthorn, Chestnut and Beech. We worked very hard to ensure that each tree was carefully planted and had its very own wooden support and plastic tree protector to give it the best chance to grow.

Children have also learned about how tree planting can improve the environment in which they live. They have also researched how trees have a positive effect on global warming.



In our last Newsletter we announced that we are now part of a Mental Health Support Team (MHST) which is attached to our school. The MHST offer early help to children and young people to support their emotional wellbeing.

As well as offering individual support to children and their families, the MHST are also delivering a 6 week intervention called 'We Eat Elephants' to classes within our school to support their emotional wellbeing.

The intervention uses story based scenarios where children meet a different character each week who is facing difficulties at home and at school. By using everyday scenarios to identify common positive and negative emotions, there is a strong focus on problem solving. 'We Eat Elephants' is great for helping children to understand what they are feeling, why and how to make changes.





Your mental health is just as important as your physical health.

Founded in 1994, Place2Be is an innovative, growing charity that is committed to helping children with their mental health. Their approach to children's mental health means they aim to intervene early to prevent life-long mental health issues. Place2Be delivers a range of services directly to children, parents and staff in schools.

Place2Be joined Timothy Hackworth Primary School in September 2020 and the service continues to grow and develop to meet the needs of the school. The in-school services currently offered to the children include Place2Talk, a lunchtime drop-in service that is open to all children to allow them to



talk with a trained counsellor about any worries or concerns they may have, and one-to-one counselling interventions, weekly counselling using talking, creative work and play, to support pupils who are struggling. Parents are offered a listening, consultation and guidance service to support their child's emotional well-being. Finally, the Place2Think service provides guidance and support to staff in a range of areas, such as managing and understanding behaviour, learning differences and enhancing personal wellbeing.







