

Each class/year group had to:


Choose a book that had a Maths theme and take part in Maths activities based around it;


There were lots of great DT activities that we did too, that linked to Maths. One of the best ones was Y6 building lollipop catapults and measuring how far they could fire a lego brick!







#### The NACE Challenge Award Update

NACE is the National Association for Able Children's Education who we have been working with for several years to develop our teaching and children's learning.

On Monday 28<sup>th</sup> June, Christabel Shepherd, (a NACE Associate and Challenge Award Assessor), completed the Preliminary Assessment of the provision made by THPS for our Most Able and Talented Learners.

# Can you think of any initiatives that we have that may closely link to our agenda for developing learning for the most able and talented?

Examples include: Building Learning Powers (BLP); and closely linked to BLP has been the development of Growth Mindset (resilience and resourcefulness when in the 'learning pit'); and the development of our questioning skills (both by adults and children); and the development of debate and intellectual curiosity via the Oxplore Big Questions and Class Dojo's Conundrums.

Christabel was very impressed by the work done by all of the staff at THPS, who have worked tirelessly to develop their teaching for all - via that of our More Able and Talented Learners - and the impact that this is having on the learning of our fantastic children.

Below are just some of the lovely quotes from the report produced by NACE about THPS:

- The work of MAT pupils on display demonstrated the features of greater depth writing and, in the case of Maths, pupils' ability to reason and make connections between concepts;
- 'A focus on More able provision permeates every subject and a great deal of work has been done to develop approaches which provide high levels of challenge for all learners';
- **'Opportunities for enrichment, extension and deeper learning** are embedded through the **development of strong external links and opportunities for learning rooted in real contexts';**
- 'Reading provision is high quality and increases cultural capital for pupils';
- 'Teachers maximise learning time so that **not a moment is wasted**';
- 'Questioning by teachers observed during the visit, expected pupils to explain their thinking;
- **'Children's learning behaviours are excellent** they were engaged, focused and working independently in all classes visited during the visit';
- **'A culture of high expectations, challenge and hard work permeates the school** Challenge Award assessment';
- 'The school's MAT provision is ably and strategically led by an enthusiastic MATCo focused on ensuring that MAT provision and outcomes are central to the school's work. The MATCo has developed strong partnerships with all school leaders, staff, governors and parents to ensure that the needs of MAT learners are understood and effectively addressed and that professional development is provided as required to support this process'







# Place2Be



Place2Be is a children's mental health charity with over 25 years' experience working with pupils, families and staff in UK schools.

We provide mental health support in schools through one-to-one and group counselling using tried and tested methods backed by research. We also offer expert training and professional qualifications.

Since joining Timothy Hackworth Primary School, Place2Be has provided a wide range of services to the children, parents, and staff. The Place2Talk service has been particularly well received with several year groups taking full advantage of this lunchtime drop-in intervention. The one-to-one counselling has utilised the resources available to provide the children with talking, creative and play interventions to



support them with any struggles they may have encountered this year. The Parent Partnership service has provided parents, with children in the one-to-one service, an understanding and encouraging space to enable them to support their child's emotional well-being. Finally, the staff service, a Place2Think, has steadily grown over the year. The service has provided the staff with guidance and support in a range of areas, including managing and understanding child behaviour, and exploring strategies to support Place2Be interventions.

Throughout the Challenge, library staff and young volunteers support the children, helping them to discover new authors and illustrators and to explore a wide range of different types of books and ways of reading,



### How the Challenge works

- Children sign up through their local library and receive a Wild World Heroes collector poster
- Children set a reading goal and borrow and read library books of their own choice during the summer, collecting special stickers to complete their poster and extra incentives along the way
- The Library Facebook page will be hosting weekly FREE events to coincide with the Summer Reading Challenge and will be uploaded every Wednesday but will be available to play back at a later date.
- Each County Durham Library will be giving out weekly **FREE** craft activity packs to keep children entertained over the summer. There will be weekly 'how to' videos uploaded to our Facebook page on a Monday.
- Library staff and volunteers are on hand to advise

Bugs, insects and other tiny critters love holes, nooks and little gaps to crawl into. Here they can be safe from birds and small animals that would enjoy them for lunch.

A Bug Hotel is something we can make in our gardens or yards to help them. You can make one from things you might find around like pieces of garden cane, old bricks, pieces of wood, pine-cones, bits of wood, straw, old pots - different bugs like different things. It's best to try a variety.

They can come in all shapes and sizes - such as the grand Bug Hotel above or the small one below. You can use your imagination to think about what the bugs near you will like best. Yours doesn't have to be the biggest - we're looking for your imagination and creativity.


