Dear Parents and Carers.

It has been a delight to welcome your children back at school for the new academic year. We are immensely proud of your children for settling in so quickly, and so well. They have enjoyed a successful half-term, and are now ready for a good rest!

As you will be aware, we have continued with our CV19 Bubble Restrictions this term. Next half-term, we will continue to operate in our Class Bubbles. Remember, safeguarding children is everyone's responsibility.









Did you know that reading for just 10 minutes a day can improve your wellbeing? In the run up to World Mental Health Day, we joined the National Literacy Trust by encouraging our teachers, pupils and families to take part in the #Take10ToRead

challenge.

We joined author Tom Percival, live on YouTube at 9:45am on Friday 8<sup>th</sup> October, who led us into the Take 10 moment at 10.00 a.m.! Tom discussed his latest book with the pupils, discussed how it linked in to supporting the mental health of people, and taught us how to show different emotions in illustrations. At 10.00 a.m., pupils either read anything they liked - from books and comics to magazines and articles - independently or as a group or were read to by their teacher.

One of our favourite sessions was when we worked with a partner to score as many points as possible in the game 'Through the Gate'. If we didn't score, Ben gave us a mini-challenge and we had to do five star jumps. We can now dribble the football with different parts of our feet. Our inspiration for a good technique for shooting was Harry Kane. Ben taught us how important it was to warm up and cool down. He made this fun by teaching us how to play 'Hares and Rabbits'. Our last session was really tricky, but we didn't give up, we showed great resilience and determination!




# Beeks, Beeks, Beeks!



# Online Safety CRC Article 19: All children have the right to be safe.

Our children in KS2 recently completed an online safety questionnaire and some children took part in meetings to use their pupil voice about online safety. It is clear that our children feel safe in school and that they have a good understanding of online safety.

Here are some of the questions that the children were asked and the responses that they gave:

What have you been learning about in Online Safety this half-term?

The children know that they should keep personal information, passwords and identities private, and even how they could use an avatar! The children also know who to go to if 'anything bad happens'.

If anybody sent you hurtful messages on the internet or on your mobile, would you know who to tell?

The children know they can talk to teachers, adults in school, parents, family members or our Head Boys or Head Girls. They also know that they can add a note in the Place2Be box, report it on a website or even to the police if it is serious.

Can you tell me one of the ways that we can respect our right to be safe when we are online?


The children had some fantastic answers! They know that they should not use another person's log-in details or password. They also know that they should keep passwords safe, be respectful online, never open emails from people they don't know, they know not to bring in their own USB, they know only to use apps the school allows and to always ask adults which websites they can use.

Do you feel safe at school?

The children responded by saying that they do feel safe at school. They said that teachers keep them safe and look after them, the security on the lpads is good, we have gates and locked doors around the school that keep them safe, there are trusted adults in the school and they are always there to help.


Throughout October, children in school have been taking part in activities in class, giving them the opportunity to learn more about the contributions of Black people in our local community, as well as wider British society.


On Friday 8<sup>th</sup> October, our Family Groups session introduced the children to Black History Month. In Key Stage One, the children shared Hannah Lee's story, 'My Hair', and discussed what makes them 'proud to be' themselves. Alana shared that she is proud to be 'good at sharing', while James is 'proud to be kind and a big brother'.

In Key Stage Two, classes watched a video with children and young people sharing their experiences of racism in the UK. The children realised that anyone experiencing racism was not having their rights respected, especially their right to live without discrimination, their right to a culture and in some cases, their right to an education. Classes then created colourful posters showing their ideas about how racism can be prevented, both within school and in the local community.

There will be plenty of other awareness-raising events over the coming year, with Show Racism the Red Card's 'Wear Red Day 2021' coming up on Friday October 22<sup>nd</sup>.

We have had an amazing start to the year in Early Years. The whole team are so proud of the children settling in so well, making friends and becoming familiar with our routines.

We have been learning about 'Ourselves' and 'Autumn' and answering the question, 'What makes me special?' The children have talked about their families and we have learnt about the body, naming different parts such as muscles and bones, and discussing how we are the same and how we are different. We have also introduced the children to some rights - such as the right to learn, the right to be listened to, and the right to be safe.

Reception have been reading lots of stories about families, feelings and important skills such as sharing and taking turns. Nursery children have enjoyed many activities linked to books including Goldilocks role-play, colour hunts, (we found all the patches for Elmer the elephant!), and making robots!

The children have enjoyed listening to poems and rhymes and learning new songs. Everyone has thoroughly explored their learning environments including the Forest School — especially the hot chocolate!

Next half-term will be an exciting one as we look at lots of different celebrations such as Halloween, Bonfire Night, Diwali and Christmas!














# RRS Article 24: Every child has the right to the best possible health. Place2Be

Place2Be joined Timothy Hackworth Primary School in September 2020 and the service has gone from strength to strength over the past year. The in-school services offer the children a place to discuss any issues, worries or concerns that they may have.

This year, Place2Be have introduced a new service that aims to provide further care and support to children and families within our school. Earlier this year, Place2Be launched the Parenting Smart website. Parenting Smart offers practical advice for parents and carers of children aged 4-11. All of the content is created by Place2Be's parenting experts. It is based on evidence and their experiences working with children, young people and their families. The service continues to provide a variety of interventions to the children, families and staff at Timothy Hackworth. These include, Place2Talk, a lunchtime drop-in service, and the one-to-one counselling interventions, a weekly counselling service using talking, creative work and play to support children who are struggling. Parents are offered a listening, consultation, and guidance service to support their child's emotional well-being. The Place2Think service provides guidance and support to all staff in a range of areas, such as managing and understanding behaviour, learning differences, and enhancing personal well-being. # CRC Article 24: All children have the right to be healthy and to be the best that they can be.

In our previous Newsletter we announced that we are now part of a Mental Health Support Team (MHST) which is attached to our school. The MHST has changed its name and is now called 'Piece of Mind', but the services they offer to school remain the same.

'Piece of Mind' offer individual support to children and their families, specialising in children who are showing early signs of anxiety or attachment difficulties. In addition, Piece of Mind also deliver a 6 week intervention called 'We Eat Elephants', an intervention which uses story-based scenarios where children meet a different character each week who is facing difficulties at home and at school. Children have to solve the problems by identifying common positive and negative emotions. 'We Eat Elephants' is great for helping children to understand what they are feeling, why and how to make changes. This term, Year 3 have been involved with this project.
