Year 5 have been working closely with members of staff from The Auckland Project. The project involves working in teams, to create a product to sell to the public!



Today Mrs. McNabb came in to show us how to bath a baby. It was lovely to meet baby Evelyn; she was very well behaved throughout her visit to Nursery.

Mrs. McNabb explained how it was important to never leave a baby alone in a bath and that the water needed to be not too hot or too cold, but just right!

We found out baby Evelyn uses baby bath bubbles and special baby soap. She doesn't stay in the bath for a very long time as she can quickly get cold. After her bath she

loves to be dried carefully before her baby lotion is applied. Next she had a little bit of talc gently patted on her skin so that her clothes go on easily and so they don't get sticky from the baby lotion.

Once her nappy was on and she was dressed she had a drink of milk from her bottle. The children were then invited to come and say, "Hello," to Evelyn. She was described by the children as, "Adorable, lovely, very cute and beautiful!"

What a lovely experience, this will definitely help us with our role play activities we are currently acting out in Nursery.

A message from Our Governing Body Road Safety Issues at Our School CRC Article 19 – All children have the right to be safe.

Dear Parents and Carers,

It is with deep regret that the Governing Body must bring this issue to your attention.

As a result of feedback from many worried parents of children in our school, significant concerns have once again been raised regarding safety on the road and pathways around our school.

We have been further informed that cars are being parked irresponsibly and in breach of the Highway Code, on junctions, yellow lines, across driveways and the nearby bus stop.

We have witnessed this for ourselves, and in the interests of child, parent and staff safety, we strongly request that all adults using vehicles to drop off children or picking children up from school, park in a responsible manner.

We know the problems that parents and carers face and understand that at times it must be difficult, but the law must be upheld before we have a serious accident or worse which involves a child, or children.

We are mindful that the dark mornings and inclement weather are already upon us, so we ask that you all give a great deal of thought about where you might park your car.

As this is a busy time for all, can we also please ask that pathways are not blocked by pedestrians, as this is resulting in people having to go onto the roads to get past, again, creating another serious hazard.

We also strongly request parents using cars, to use the one-way voluntary system to reduce the risk of your child being hurt. This voluntary one-way system is for your child's safety. Please use it.

We are currently running a Road Safety Competition, organised by Miss Johnson and the Junior Road Safety Officers, regarding road and pedestrian safety at the school gates. As part of this competition, we are welcoming any ideas that can be shared to reduce the risk of children being hurt by irresponsible drivers.

As a Rights Respecting School, we feel that your child's safety is becoming increasingly at risk due to the serious road safety issues around our school. We look forward to a safer environment outside of our school gates.

We can only do this if everyone acts in a responsible way, and with your child's well-being in mind. Thank you for your support.

Key Stage I SATs Information for Parents and Carers

Thank you to all those parents who attended our SATs meeting; we hope you found this really helpful. We appreciate you taking your time to come and see us. Sometime in May 2019, all 7 year olds will take the End of Key Stage I National Tests. All schools deliver the same tests and it is up to each individual school when these tests are administered. These tests are designed to check that children in all schools are making progress. We have the whole month to do the tests; children are tested on Reading, Writing, Spelling and Maths. As evidence in their books is also assessed until the end of June this plays a very important part in their final result, please make sure your child attends school every day. If they are unwell in school, we will ring you.

We do not tell the children when these tests are happening to ensure a stress free environment as we like to keep it as relaxed as possible. A few weeks prior to the tests we begin to give the children toast, milk and biscuits to keep their energy levels up. As always make sure your child has a good night's sleep so they can perform their best. We mark the tests internally and this is checked by the local authority's advisors or inspectors. They also check the children's school books for evidence of attainment and that all standards and criteria have been met.

Here are a few ways how you can help:

- You can practise spellings at home.
- Read regularly (every night).
- Ask questions about the text that they have just read.
- Chant times tables (mainly 2s, 3s, 5s and 10s).

(The children need to know the inverse too as they have to divide as well as multiply.)

- Complete Maths homework every week.
- Make sure your child has had enough sleep.

Nursery and the two year old children have enjoyed lots of activities based around dental hygiene. The children have been practising cleaning teeth on a largescale using a giant set of teeth and brushes.

The two year olds also had the opportunity to clean their own teeth with some brushes that were slightly smaller!

We also looked at foods that were good and bad for our teeth and sorted them accordingly.

These activities were followed up by a visit from our school nurse Sara Spratt who emphasised to the children the importance of good dental hygiene.

Over the last four weeks families from Nursery and both Reception classes have been invited by their teachers to come and take part in a mini games workshop, playing traditional games alongside their child.

The children have thoroughly enjoyed this experience and the feedback from family members including parents, grandparents and uncles has been really positive. Playing games such as dominoes, card games, dice games and lotto games are not only great at reinforcing maths skills, early reading skills are also encouraged through pre reading skills such as matching. Obviously the main emphasis is on having fun and learning through play whilst refining skills in counting, reasoning, colour and number recognition.

We were very proud of the children's behaviour and their manners during these fun sessions also very grateful to all the families that have given up their time to come and take part in the games workshops.

We are aiming to set up a mini lending library, where families can borrow games to play at home to consolidate the learning at home and obviously to continue the fun without time constraints. Over the next term we will be inviting other families and children to take part too.





Delivering the National School Breakfast Programme

Breakfast Bagels

Our bagel breakfast for all children has been a huge success! The children are thoroughly enjoying the warm bagels, especially on these cold mornings! Our bagels are packed full of protein, vitamins and minerals, are free from artificial additives and have no E-numbers.



Independent research has found that Y2 pupils in schools, who have been provided with a free and nutritious breakfast have boosted their reading, writing and maths by an average of 2 months' progress, compared to schools with no breakfast provision. As a school we are encouraged by this data and have started to see the benefits already. The Family Action National School Breakfast Programme was formed in partnership with Magic Breakfast and the Department for Education to combat hunger, as over half a million children in the UK come to school too hungry to learn. We are delighted to be invited to take part in this initiative and are proud to be a part of the Family Action National School Breakfast Programme.

This year's Christmas Fayre was particularly busy, with stalls including cakes, tombola, name the bear, white elephant, homemade crafts, balloons and the ever popular toy stall. Our children also took part in the fayre by selling cakes and biscuits, which they had made as part of their enterprise project. e-Cadets





Welcome to an update about our e-Cadets. Our e-Cadets consist of 16 children from year 3 to year 6 (2 from each class). The main role of the e-Cadets is to work together as a team to promote online safety throughout our school. We also take part in a range of termly challenges together set by the e-Cadets.

Last term we had our first meeting and discussed about 'screen time'. E-cadets led a class assembly discussing screen time. After discussing what screen time is and the damages too much watching a screen can do they asked children to answer a survey to find out how much screen time we all actually use.

E-cadets, in our second meeting compared what a real friend was compared to an online friend. E-cadets from each class led a class activity and watched an age appropriate video then completed their own activity.
