The Rule of Law is one of our **British Values**.

Laws are made by the Government in Parliament. Members of Parliament decide on laws and vote on whether to pass them.



Laws are rules that must be followed! If a person breaks the law, then they suffer a consequence: a warning, a fine, a curfew or a prison sentence.



The police uphold the law. A person who commits a crime is called a criminal.
