What is a ritual?

A ritual is a religious or sacred ceremony that involves a series of actions performed in a certain order.

Why do people do rituals?

People do rituals to show their dedication towards their religion or God.

Similarities and Differences

These rituals all involve giving the opportunity to people to show dedication to their religion.

They all include prayer.

Eucharist and Pesach use symbolic food during the rituals, whereas Salah does not.

Muslims do their ritual five times every day.

Different Rituals

Eucharist

During the Eucharist (Holy Communion), Christians will show their dedication towards God. During the Last Supper, Jesus told his disciples to eat bread and think of his bones, and drink wine to think of his blood.

Salah

Muslims pray five times a day. Before each prayer, Muslims perform a ritual. This includes making themselves as clean as possible before they can pray to Allah. They remove their socks and shoes, clean their feet, hands and face, and then use a

prayer mat.

Pesach

Jewish people celebrate during Pesach to commemorate (remember) how Moses saved the Hebrews from Egypt. The first night of the festival includes a large meal called Seder, where foods of symbolic

significance are shared alongside prayers.

· Holy Communion	the Christian ritual, also known as Eucharist, to show the togetherness of Christians and God

Mass	the greatest form of worship for Catholics
Pesach (Passover)	a Jewish festival where they remember how Moses led the Hebrew slaves out of Egypt

submission	In Islam, submission means to live their daily lives showing their faith to Allah.
