Dear Parents and Carers,

I hope that you enjoy reading this half-term's Newsletter. The children have thoroughly enjoyed meeting new friends as classes have mixed together in year groups for playtimes and lunchtimes outside. Although CV19 cases are continuing to rise in Shildon, and in our school too, we plan to relax more restrictions as soon as we are able to, when it is safe to do so.

Thank you to parents and carers who responded to our 'Staggered Starts and Finishes' questionnaire. In total, we received 137 responses from parents, carers and staff. Children in Years 4, 5 and 6 also responded, using their pupil voice. Out of the 137 responses received, 82 respondents voted for staggered starts and finishes to stop, and 52 respondents voted for the starts and finished to continue. Our children in Years 4, 5 and 6, across the six classes, five classes voted for staggered starts and finishes to stop, and one class voted for them to continue.

As a result of the responses collected, our staggered starts and finishes will be coming to an end after May Half-Term. Staggered starts and finishes will continue after the Easter Holidays. More information will follow about arrangements for this after the Easter Holidays.

Well done also to all of our staff and children in school for their contributions.





This half term, Megan, a specialist Gymnastics coach, worked with Year 2 to teach Gymnastics. Year 2 have been learning a variety of basic gymnastic shapes. We have developed lots of other skills too; these include skipping, hopping, chasse steps, cat leaps, bunny hops and crab walks. Our favourite warm-up games were Stuck in the Mud, Corner Game and Simon Says. We all enjoyed the travelling and jumping session the most because we were introduced to the fundamental jumps in gymnastics. We then performed the jumps individually on our mats making sure that we had the correct form and landing position. Some of us introduced a cartwheel into our performance.

Throughout February, the children and adults at Timothy Hackworth Primary School have enjoyed celebrating LGBT+ History Month. We originally started marking this month in 2020, when we were beginning our journey with Educate and Celebrate towards the GOLD standard in the Pride in Inclusion Award. We continue to embed these events into our school calendar.

This year, LGBT+ History Month began with a Family Group session looking at correct terminology, recapping the Protected Characteristics of the 2010 Equality Act. Children in KS2 created a piece of artwork to encourage tolerance in our local community. KS1 children created their own recipe for a special family.





Later on in LGBT+ History Month, children throughout school have taken part in a piece of work in English based around some of the books from our Equality and Diversity book boxes. The end of this unit of work was marked by our whole school Rainbow Day on Friday 18th February. Children were able to come into school wearing their year group colour, inspired by the PRIDE rainbow flag. They then took part in Rainbow-themed lessons over the course of the day. Each class was able to nominate an Equality and Diversity champion and these children were awarded a Rainbow flag bag to wear while they are in school.

We all curled up with a book, with some hot chocolate and marshmallows at the end of the day – our very own school special 'bedtime story'!


As well as enjoying lots of books, stories and poems throughout the day, pupils also took part in a range of activities which included the following:








Religious Education Indian Workshop

On Monday the 28th of March, Year 1 and Year 3 took part in an Indian Dance Workshop. This experience enabled the children to learn about Hinduism. During each workshop, the children worked hard to learn some of the hastas, and at the end of the workshop, the children were able to perform an Indian Dance. All of the children thoroughly enjoyed their Indian Dance experience!





These are the hand movements that act as a form of sign language to help to tell a story or demonstrate themes such as weather, animals or places.

We are keen scientists at Timothy Hackworth Primary School!

This term we took part in British Science Week. The theme this year was 'Growth'. The children thoroughly enjoyed taking part in their science afternoons and Mrs Paramore was impressed at the range of science learning our school showed when presented with the word 'Growth'.

In Year 3, a member of staff from the Locomotion Museum, who happens to be a past teacher and good friend of Timothy Hackworth Primary School, came to do some practical science with us. Year 3 explored how they could increase the volume of a bubble and how materials react with one another to change and grow into a new material (that behaves rather oddly!)









Year 5 made recycled bird feeders and then carried out a bird watch survey on the school field. Did you know that in Spring, birds are working very hard to increase their body size (grow) ready for their big responsibilities of laying, hatching and caring for young chicks.







Year 6 linked the theme of 'Growth' to their class learning. The children have found that in order for us to grow and maintain healthy bodies and minds, we need exercise. They planned and performed a range of exercises and recorded how this affected heartbeat.



The science didn't stop there! We have also had classes exploring the school field to find signs of new growth as we head into Spring. Classes have been investigating how animals grow and how zoologists can monitor animal health. We are growing a range of flowers and vegetables to observe how they grow, and the rate of growth for different varieties. Not to mention seeing if the MRS GREN aliens could survive life on Mars.








Fairtrade Fortnight.



During Fairtrade Fortnight in March, the children focussed on the impact of our 'carbon footprint', (the damage that we cause to the environment through our everyday activities), and how this contributes to climate change, which is critically affecting farmers in countries such as The Ivory Coast, in Africa. We looked at different ways that we could support 'Climate Justice' in order to help these farmers and their families to achieve their right to healthy food, clean water and medical care. The children then wrote a promise for a change that they would like to make in order to help the environment. Some suggestions included: walking to school, buying Fairtrade products, running the tap less when we brush our teeth and turning off lights when we leave a room. It was wonderful to see so many fantastic ideas throughout the school; I hope that we are all able to stick to them!

Timothy Hackworth Primary School offer funded 2 Year Old places, and children are eligible for a Nursery place from the start of the term following their 3rd birthday (if spaces are available and your child's 3rd birthday falls before the 1st of April). An application form is available from the School Office or in the 'Admissions' section of the school website www.timothhackworthschool.co.uk.

Children either attend 5 morning sessions, 5 afternoon sessions or $2 \frac{1}{2}$ days at the beginning of the week or $2 \frac{1}{2}$ days at the end of the week

The Nursery offers 30 hours free childcare to eligible parents, although 30-hour places are subject to availability. If you are entitled to 30 hours of Nursery, you will need your 15-digit code to access this provision. Please contact the School Office for further information.

Early Years Update



Another busy half term for the children in Early Years!

The children in Nursery have been learning about farm animals and new life. They have read stories, sang songs, explored different textures that animals might feel like and have discovered all the different sounds animals make! The children have planted and grown cress and beans after reading 'Jack and the Beanstalk' and learned that plants need water, soil, and sunlight to grow. The two-year-olds have been egg hunting in their Forest School sessions.

Children in Reception have been learning about different habitats around the world. We have read stories and looked at non-fiction resources about rainforests, deserts, and the polar regions. Did you know that not all deserts are hot and sandy? We have painted and drawn animals, written animal riddles and have moved like snakes, jaguars and monkeys around the PE apparatus! We learned about people who live in these different places, what their homes are like and what they wear to keep cool.

I am incredibly proud to inform you that Timothy Hackworth Primary School has been awarded Advocate School Status for our innovative and impactful use of Picture News. Picture News is a news resource specially designed to be used with primary aged children. Each week, Picture News choose a current news story and produce an image with a focus question for children to consider. This is always thought provoking and relevant to current affairs.

At Timothy Hackworth, Picture News provides the launch-pad for our 'Let's Think; Let's Talk' sessions. 'Let's Think; Let's Talk' is designed to encourage every child to have a voice, to know how to respectfully use their voice to share their own thoughts and opinions, and to challenge the viewpoints of others. Each story is carefully chosen to support the children's personal development: socially, morally, culturally, and spiritually. We place our Rights Respecting values at the centre of these lessons, using our Pupil Voice Charters to ensure that we show respect in our speaking and listening. Recent lessons have asked 'What would a city of the future look like?', 'Should the rules be the same for everyone?' and 'How important is it to show bravery as a leader?'. We have seen a fantastic impact since the introduction of 'Let's Think; Let's Talk', with children more aware of the world around them and more able to eloquently share their thoughts, opinions and questions about our world.

We are very pleased that our use of Picture News has been recognised nationally and we will wear our advocate school badge with great pride.









Online Safety—Article 19—All children have the right to be safe.

This term, we have been focusing on the impact of too much screen time on our physical and mental wellbeing. We spoke about how games and technology can often become addictive. Due to this, we can sometimes lose track of time and even lose out on sleep! As the weather gets better, we have made a pledge to ensure we are getting enough time socialising with our friends and playing outdoors and not spending too time on our tablets, PCs and games consoles. To help us, we created a list of activities that we could do to give our brains a break from screen time. Some our favourites included:

- · Reading a book
- · Going for a walk with my family
- · Have some 'wind down' time
- · Engage in some mindfulness/meditation
- · Complete my homework
- · Play board games
- · Go to the park with my family
- · Play football or any other sport
- · Sketch and draw

The Place2Be service within Timothy Hackworth Primary School continues to support the children, families, and staff within the school. The service offers a variety of interventions that provide safe and appropriate support at a time that meets the needs of the individuals involved. All the interventions aim to provide a safe and supportive environment for everyone to talk about their worries and concerns.

Parenting Smart

Place2Be launched a new face-to-face intervention in September to provide additional support to families. The Personalised Individual Parenting Training (PIPT) programme is a face-to-face intervention, and it works by coaching parents and carers in how to interact more positively and parent more effectively.

However, not all parents are able to commit to a face-to-face programme, so the online Parenting Smart website was created. The parent support website that was launched at the beginning of the year has been well received by all schools linked with Place2Be. The Parenting Smart is a hub of short, useful articles written by Place2Be's parenting experts. Each article, aimed at parents of children aged 4 to 11 years, shares practical advice on several different topics.

These topics include:

Difficulties at mealtimes, Sibling rivalry, Peer pressure, Safe social media use, Co-parenting following a separation or divorce, Arguments and conflicts.

Following the success of both the face-to-face programme and the website, a new online course has been created. The Parenting Smart online course begins in April and is a free course that runs for seven weeks.
