Hip Hop began in America in the 1970s. This musical style emerged in New York, where block parties became protest events.

The parties would take place outside and would feature an MC (Master of Ceremonies) who would speak about political issues in the communities. Hip Hop includes programmed beats, rapping and samples. A sample is a short, recorded sound often played back in a sequence from an electronic device called a 'sampler' or a 'drum machine'.

The rapping element could be traced back to Africa where, centuries ago, people told stories rhythmically over the beats of drums.

backing loops	A repeated piece of music which can be heard in the background of a song.
cover	A new performance or recording of a previously recorded song by someone other than the original artist or composer.

interlude	A short piece of music placed between longer pieces of music.
Old School Hip Hop	Refers to music created around 1979 to 1983.
Rap	Rhythmically Accentuated Poetry.
scratching	Sometimes referred to as 'scrubbing'. DJs move a vinyl record back and forth on a turntable to produce a sound.
tag ending	A piece of music added to the end.
