


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Pronunciation - Silent Final Consonant The final consonant in French words is almost always silent. There are some exceptions to this rule, such as <i>ours</i> , in which the final 's' is sounded out.	Pronunciation - Liaison Liaison: when a word ending in a vowel sound is followed by a word beginning with a vowel sound, a final consonant that is usually silent can be sounded out, e.g. <i>C'est une éléphant</i> . Similarly in English, It's an elephant.	Grammar - Conjunction A conjunction can link two words or phrases. It can link the final two nouns in a sequence, and the final two adjectives in a sequence.	Grammar - Adjective An adjective describes a noun. In English, the adjective usually precedes the noun it is describing; in French the adjective usually follows the noun it is describing.	Grammar - Syntax Syntax is the order in which words and phrases are put together to make a meaningful sentence.
