The Dental Nurse visits Early Years









As part of our topic on 'Ourselves and All About Me', we found out about our bodies and keeping healthy and we found out about how important it is to look after our teeth and keep them clean.

Mrs. Tomlinson, a Dental Nurse came in to visit the 2's, Nursery and Reception, and she showed us how to clean our teeth properly, cleaning the top first, then the bottom, and that we should clean them for at least two minutes to remove all the plaque.

We found out it's important to clean our teeth twice a day: in the morning and at night before going to bed, and also after eating sweets or sugary drinks. We talked about foods that were good for our teeth, like milk, and those that could cause damage like sugary sweets, drinks and fruit juices.

We have 20 teeth to clean but when we get older and get our second set of teeth, we will have 32 teeth. Teeth are the hardest thing in your body.

We enjoyed practising cleaning big teeth and teeth in different creatures, and timed ourselves to make sure that we had cleaned them for long enough.









Road Safety Training with Year 3

Year 3 had a very interesting time learning about Road Safety. We learnt how to cross the road safely, even when there are parked cars, how to spot the dangers, what the different road signs mean and all about the different types of road crossings.

We worked in small groups and listened very carefully to our Road Safety Trainers. They were very impressed with our behaviour and good manners, especially as our second session was in the pouring rain. We learnt that it was essential to remember how to cross safely, especially in bad weather.



As a Gold Award Anti-Bullying School, we have taken part in Anti-Bullying Week. This year, the theme was 'Make a Noise about Bullying'.

The children took part in a variety of activities, learning about different types of bullying through online lessons, P.S.H.E. lessons and Family Groups lessons in which they looked at the difference between banter and bullying and role played some different senarios.

What is Bullying? The repetitive, intentional hurting of one person or group by another person or group, where the relationship involves an imbalance of power. Bullying can be physical, verbal or psychological.

It can happen face to face or online.

Banter? - The playful and friendly exchange of teasing remarks.

But when Banter becomes hurtful it can become a form of bullying.

Just to be clear It's not banter if:

- You would be upset if someone said it to you;
- 2. It's hurtful;
- 3. You're not friends:
- 4. Someone's asked you to stop;
- 5. The target isn't laughing;
- 6. It focuses on someone's insecurities.

We talked about where to go for help if you were upset or felt you were being bullied. The children were very good and knew they could ask a Trusted Adult, put a note in the class Worry box or Place2Be box or talk to an Anti-bullying Ambassador.

To coincide with Children in Need and Anti-Bullying week, we supported Odd Socks Day and celebrated our differences. We took time to learn about each other's interests and likes. There was a great variety of socks! We even designed our own odd socks and T-Shirts.
















Equality and Diversity Gold Award

Black History Month and Wear Red Day

CRC Article 2: All children have the right to live without discrimination. CRC Article 30: All children have the right to their own culture and religion.

October is Black History Month in the UK and this year's theme was, "Celebrating our Sisters." The aim of this theme was to learn about Black and Mixed Heritage British women who have shaped UK history.

Throughout October, children in school have been taking part in activities in class, giving them the opportunity to learn more about the contributions of Black people in our local community, as well as wider British society.

On Friday 20th October, we celebrated Show Racism the Red Card's 'Wear Red Day 2023' in school. The children were invited to come into school wearing something red and as a whole school we discussed Black History Month during our Family Group session. During Family Groups, the children learnt about the achievements and accomplishments of influential Black British women from different industries (i.e. politics, sports, music and literature).

The children recognised that often influential woman with Black and Mixed Heritage from UK history suffer from not having their rights respected: their right to live without discrimination and their right to live within their culture. In mixed aged groups, the children created some posters explaining how important these rights are and displaying the achievements of their chosen person.



Reception Phonics and Early Reading Meeting

In October, Reception parents met for an early reading skills and phonics meeting with Mrs. Corney and Mrs. Condron. We discussed the importance of giving children the opportunity to explore quality story books and the impact this has on children's future reading skills. In school, we teach systematic synthetic phonics through the 'Essential Letters and Sounds' programme. The meeting gave parents and carers the opportunity to see how this is discreetly taught on a daily basis in Reception and Key Stage 1.






Fundamental Movement Skills
