

Safer parking at our school gates

Our road safety theme for this half term is all about 'WALKING TO SCHOOL'. This is an important part of road safety, as it prevents congestion outside of school. Lots of cars around school make it difficult for children to see, and be seen near the busy road. The Junior Road Safety Officers have been encouraging drivers to park away from school, and then walk the last few minutes of the journey. This helps children to be wide awake when they arrive at school.

The Junior Road Safety Officers have also been very busy making their own Pledge. They need all adults to make the commitment to drive more safely. They are wanting everybody to make simple changes to protect all children, build happier communities, and to help save the planet. They would like everybody to drive to the speed limits, but to slow down to 20 mph around school. Driving slowly and smoothly saves fuel, money and reduces pollution.

Let's work together and remember to use our voluntary one-way system. To use the one-way system, please enter Oxford street from Byerley Road and exit via Ruskin Avenue, then onto Diamond street. This will help to keep all children and adults safe. Thank you!

Always remember to: Stop, Look, Listen and Think.



Digital parenting top tips



CRC Article19: All children have the right to be looked after and kept safe.



A quick guide to staying up-to-date with what your child is doing online:

Think about how you guide your family in the real world and use the parenting skills you already have, such as showing an interest in their lives and the company they keep, to do the same in the digital world.

Try out the technologies your child enjoys. Download some of their music and have a go at the games they like.

Talk to friends and family about how they manage their children's digital lives.

Remind older siblings that websites they use may not be suitable for younger brothers and sisters.

Make digital issues part of everyday conversation. Use news stories or things that have happened to people you know to raise subjects like cyberbullying and copyright infringement by downloading music or films you haven't paid for.

When you're talking about bullying, relationships and other issues, don't forget to include the online aspects.

Ask your child about whether the issues they face are different online and offline.

Don't be afraid to set boundaries and rules. Children may complain but research shows they respond to this.

Talk to your child about the importance of controlling their online reputation by thinking before they post or share anything.


Children have really enjoyed taking part in lessons and discussions based on the resources available through our Equality and Diversity Book Box. These books are provided through a charity called Educate and Celebrate; having them available in school allows teachers and the children to investigate together and experience the broad range of diversity that exists within our society. Sharing these stories as a class and in small groups has led to some interesting conversations about prejudice and how some people's rights are always not respected. Staff have been very impressed with how sensible and mature the children have been during these lessons, often expressing the opinion that everyone is different, but everyone is equal.

Cody in 4H summed up, "We don't judge people however they look. Even if they are black or white, big or small, thick or thin or boy or girl. No matter who you are, you should still be treated the same."


Dribble the ball hard. The more time the ball spends in your hand, the more control you have of the ball. The harder you dribble, the quicker it gets back in your hand.

Use your finger tips to control the ball, not your palm.








Year 3 brought their History studies to life with an amazing visit to
