Class teachers in KS1 and KS2 deliver weekly Music lessons based on our Music Curriculum Overview in Years 1-6. Our Music Curriculum Overview is based on the Charanga Programme supported by Durham County Council Music Service. This programme has been carefully chosen due to its effective support for staff who do not have a particular specialism in Music. The Curriculum Overview for Music is carefully planned in sequences to allow children to review, remember, apply and deepen their learning in Music. In EYFS, Music is delivered as an integral part of the EYFS curriculum.
