



What is World Day Against Child Labour?

- Throughout history, children have had to work in all sorts of different ways. In the 20th Century, the world agreed that any work that endangered children or stopped them from enjoying all their rights was unacceptable.
- In 2002, The International Labour Organization (which was set up by the United Nations) launched the first World Day Against Child Labour to highlight the struggles faced by working children.
- Held each year on 12th June, the day is intended to promote and encourage the growing worldwide movement against child labour. It is hard for most children and young people in the UK to imagine what it must be like to have to work as a child.

What is World Day Against Child Labour?

World Day Against Child Labor aims to focus attention on the global extent of child labor and the action and efforts needed to eliminate it. Each year on 12 June, the Day brings together governments, employers and worker organizations, and civil society, as well as millions of people from around the world to highlight the plight of child laborers and what can be done to help them.

This International Day was launched by the International Labour Organization (ILO) in 2002.





I am responsible for my actions. It is important to remember they can have an impact on people, places and things. We can choose actions that can help both ourselves and others.


