

Trains are painted with Pride flag designs to celebrate and support the LGBTQ+ community.

What is Pride Month?

What is the Pride flag?

It's a time when people all over the world celebrate being proud of who they are—especially people who may be gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender, or part of the LGBTQ+ community.

People have not always been treated fairly for being different. Pride Month is about remembering those times, celebrating how things have changed, and reminding everyone that we should always be kind, fair and respectful to others.

The Pride flag is a rainbow-coloured flag. It is used to show that we care about everyone and want all people to feel safe, happy and proud of who they are.

What do the colours mean?

There are different versions of the Pride flag, but one of the most popular is called the Progress Pride Flag.

Red - Life Stange - Healing Yellow - Stanlight Green - Nature Blue - Peace Purple - Spirit








Mutual Respect & Tolerance

Protected Characteristics

Sexual orientation is about who someone loves or is attracted to. Pride Month is important because it reminds us that everyone deserves respect and kindness, no matter who they love.





















UN Rights of the Child



Every child has the right to be treated fairly and equally, no matter who they are. Adults can teach children about discrimination and inspire them to speak up for themselves and others.



Pride Month is about the celebration of acceptance and inclusion.
For a long time, some people weren't allowed to be who they were.

Have you ever felt like that? It feels really bad, right? They're celebrating because being who you are is awesome.

The law has changed to be fairer for all and to recognise the differences people have.

It is against the law to discriminate against anyone because of their sex, gender, religion, disability or certain other personal characteristics

These are the Protected Characteristics.

- Duty Bearers and Rights Holders commit to this shared goal by learning about their rights, through their rights and for the rights of others.






The message you want to send to the people who see the train. Can you promote equality and diversity?
